ABOUT TAFFY AND HIS GUESTS

Taffy Thomas , MBE, is England's first storyteller laureate and patron of The Society for Storytelling. Taffy received The English Folk Dance and Song Society Gold Badge award in December 2010. With Taffy's head bursting with stories, riddles and folklore, professional storyteller Giles Abbot once commented, "when Taffy goes it will be like a library burning down."

Paul Jackson is passionate about re-introducing storytelling to mainstream education with presentations at over 2000 schools, a recent tour through China and Paul has presented at festivals including Glastonbury and Latitude.

Daniel Morden has been a professional storyteller since 1989 and his work has taken him across the world from remote First Nation communities in the Arctic Circle to the Sydney Writers Festival. He has delighted audiences closer to home at Hay and Cheltenham festivals, the Barbican, National Theatre and the British Museum. He is a published author and has researched and retold a wide variety of stories, including Greek myth, Welsh folktale and the tales that inspired Shakespeare and Chaucer. He was awarded the Hay Festival medal for his contribution to storytelling. In his new work 'Beastly!'
